Subject: “Operation Keelhaul Revisited”

Mission Statement

Speaker for APRIL 21st, 2011–Marvin Worthy (To Be Introduced By Deputy Commander Goulding)

Marvin was born in Detroit, MI of Georgia parentage. He moved back to Georgia to attend North Georgia College and was inducted into the Army in 1943. After basic he was assigned to the Corp of Engineers and was later elevated to the water supply with the rating of Corporal.

He landed in France at LeHarve and was moved to the front through Southern France, crossed the Rhine and crossed the Danube River into Germany. His company met up with the Russians in Austria as the war ended, he was subsequently hospitalized for non-combat wounds and was exposed to Asbestos. He is now 100% disabled from home.

Marvin will elucidate on *Operation Keelhaul*, which was carried out in Northern Italy, Germany, Dachau, Austria, Canada, and the United States, by American and British forces to repatriate Soviet Armed Forces POW's of the Nazis to the Soviet Union between August 1946 and May 1947. The term *Keelhaul* was later applied to other Allied acts of often forced repatriation of former residents of the USSR after the ending of WW II that sealed the fate of millions of post-war refugees fleeing Eastern Europe.

It is not known how many Cossacks and Russians were forcibly repatriated, but from research and books written by Peter Juxley-Blythe, Julius Epstein and others, millions of Russian men, women and children seeking sanctuary were forced back against their will to face Joseph Stalin's firing squads and bayonets or serve hard labor in the death camps of Siberia. It should be noted that the official record of this appeasement policy, "*Operation Keelhaul*" is still classified as top-secret by Washington.

Review of MARCH 17th, 2011 Speaker –Doug Huggins (Introduced by Deputy Commander Goulding)

Doug Huggins delighted Round Table members in March by giving us the history, and then some, of the *U.S.S. St. Louis* (CL-49). The *St. Louis* was laid down on 10 December 1936, launched on 15 April 1938 and commissioned in May 1939 at which time Captain Charles H. Morrision assumed command. Shakedown was completed on 6 October after which she began Neutrality Patrol Operations. She participated in fleet maneuvers and conducted patrols during the winter of 1940-1941, was overhauled, then steamed for Pearl Harbor on 20 June and resumed operations.

Doug's first assignment after graduating Navy Boot Camp in San Diego was onboard the *St. Louis* to participate in training exercises in the Hawaiian waters. She would be the lead ship in her class of Light Cruisers and the 5th ship in the U.S. Navy named after the city of St. Louis. She sailed out to do Patrol Exercises in the Wake Island – Midway Atoll – Guam vicinity with her battle force and returned to Pearl in September 1941.

Doug had vivid memories of the attack on the morning of December 7th, 1941. The *St. Louis* was moored to the pier of the Southeast Lock at the time. The ship came to general quarters within a few minutes of the start of the attack and started firing her anti-aircraft guns, shooting down three enemy aircraft before moving away from the pier

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and heading for the South Channel and the open sea to pursue and search for the Japanese strike force. For its success at Pearl Harbor, the *St. Louis* was given the nickname, 'The Lucky Lou.'. After the attack, Doug sadly found out that the high school buddy he had enlisted and graduated from Navy Boot Camp with was killed onboard the U.S.S. Arizona that day, one of the first to be killed in the attack.

Doug resumed his duty as Electricians Mate onboard the *St. Louis* as a escort ship to Marine troop and plane ships, doing shore bombardment and engaging the enemy wherever they encountered them. She was active throughout the war, fighting in the *Battle of Kula Bay* and the *Battle of Kolombangara*. The *St. Louis*'s war wounds included bombing attacks by Japanese Dive Bombers, Torpedo Bombers, and *Kamikazes*. Although heavily damaged during these attacks, with many crew killed and wounded, she survived living up to her nickname.

Doug was proud to have served aboard her, and after his service on the *St. Louis* served on two Minesweepers and a PC Boat, the USS PC478 in the South Pacific. Thank you Doug for your service in the U.S. Navy and for a job well done.

General Patton's Famous "Blood and Guts" Speech to His Troops June 5th, 1944

A follow-up response to Patton's comments was made by Saul K. Padover, part of a article in Harper's Magazine, 1946

"The Paper-Slaves"

These Germans were so police-harried and document-conscious that they continued to be uneasy unless we looked at their personal papers. They forced their papers upon us to prove that everything was in order.

I have never seen a people so paper crazy. They hugged to their bosoms birth certificates, military records, military passes, travel passes, discharge papers, baptism records, Aryan records, marriage records, pension records, pay records, work records, health records; in short, records to prove that they were alive and that perhaps they had a right to be alive.

They also carried letters, snapshots, and family mementos. It was amusing to observe this addiction to paper, especially paper signed and stamped officially, until one realized that this was the behavior of slaves 'who worshiped bureaucrats. In the German *Polizeistaat* paper was sacred, paper spelled security.

It was not until later, when I was in Buchenwald and saw heaps of human bones-and-ashes in one corner of the camp and carefully preserved records of the victims in another corner, that I understood a strange truth about the Germans that they had no compunction about burning human beings but that they would not burn paper records.
